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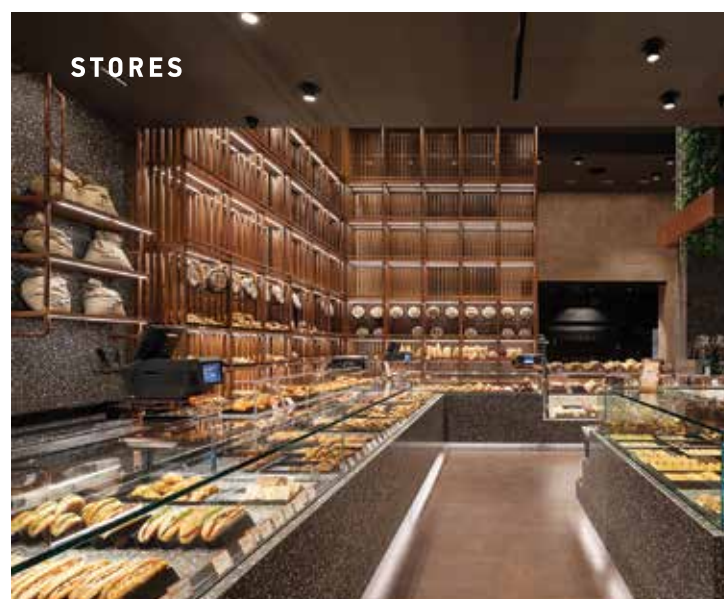
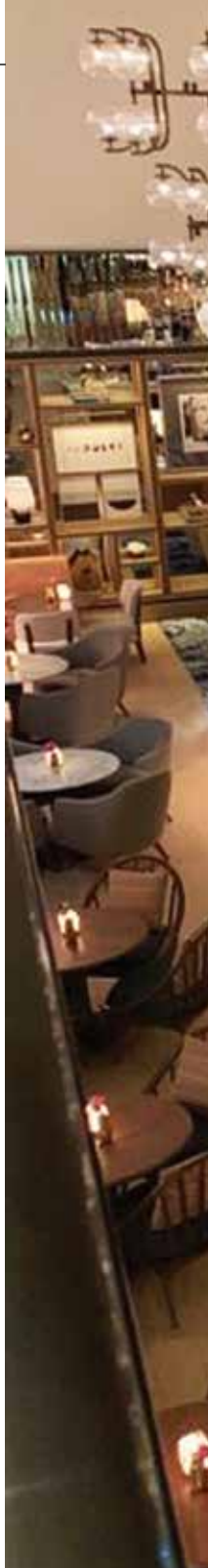

Dear Reader

This issue of MAN Magazine marks the beginning of preparations for the Arab-Hellenic Chamber's flagship event, the **15th Arab-Hellenic Economic Forum**, scheduled for 25 & 26 November. This year's Forum will focus on the Energy and Construction sectors, reflecting their strategic and economic significance for both the Arab world and Greece. These sectors are closely interconnected with a vast range of business fields, creating broader prospects for cooperation and opportunity for participants.

Our decision to place these two sectors at the heart of the Forum stems from the exceptional resources with which the Arab world is endowed. At a time when global supply chains face mounting pressure and food and commodity prices remain elevated, the case for strengthening regional trade and economic cooperation has never been more compelling.

The principal reason, however, lies in Greece's internationally recognised leadership in maritime shipping. With a fleet of more than 5,000 vessels, Greece has built a maritime tradition its people rightly regard as a national asset, one that demands continuous investment and development. Greece has also established an outstanding record across numerous sectors, particularly energy and construction, the very industries that define the agenda of our 15th Forum. Its longstanding contribution to infrastructure development across many Arab countries deserves particular recognition; indeed, few European countries, if any, have matched Greece's presence and achievements in this field. Today, relations between Greece and the Arab world continue to gather momentum across multiple sectors, supported by strategic projects that are adding a new and increasingly significant dimension to this partnership.

Ultimately, shared interests are the force that shapes and sustains the course of international relations. It is from this conviction that the Arab-Hellenic Chamber continues its longstanding mission of advancing economic cooperation between the Arab world and Greece, a commitment that has guided our work for more than four and a half decades.

About: The “15th Arab-Hellenic Economic Forum” is the flagship event of the Arab-Hellenic Chamber, scheduled for November 25-26, 2026.

Interview with H.E. Mohammed Sbihi, Ambassador of His Majesty King Mohammed VI of Morocco



As of this issue, the Arab-Hellenic Chamber is introducing a series of interviews with Arab Ambassadors accredited to the Hellenic Republic. We are delighted to start with H.E. Mohammed Sbihi, Ambassador of His Majesty King Mohammed VI of Morocco, and Dean of the Arab Diplomatic Corps, to shed light on Morocco's development and growth and highlight opportunities for partnership with Greek businesses.

July 30th marks the anniversary of the accession of His Majesty King Mohammed VI to the Throne of the Kingdom of Morocco in 1999. What would you identify as the most significant achievements of the Kingdom during His Majesty's reign, and what are the priorities that will shape Morocco's future?

As an Ambassador of His Majesty the King, I would like to start with that the list of achievements we have witnessed under His Majesty King Mohammed VI is long and the development and growth are impressive. Let's start with our country's motorway network, which has grown sixfold over the past decades (3000Km), and the Al Boraq high-speed rail network (launched in 2018) which connects Tangier and Casablanca over approximately 350 km. Morocco is the first African country to operate a high-speed rail line and its extension to Agadir is underway and will be operational by 2029. At the same time, the Tanger Med port complex, which became operational in 2007, ranks among the world's largest ports, with connections to more than 180 ports in 70 countries, while the Dakhla port (the largest deep-water port in Africa on the Atlantic coast), which will connect Sahel countries (Chad, Niger, Mali and Burkina Faso) to the Atlantic Ocean, is 65% complete and is expected to become operational in 2029.

In the energy sector, Morocco is embracing sustainability, with renewable energy accounting for approximately 50% of installed electricity generation capacity. In the aerospace sector, we have marked significant growth, with Morocco now being an integrated industrial platform hosting major international groups. The automotive industry has become the Kingdom's leading export sector, driven by the industrial ecosystems of Tangier and Kenitra, and the network of industrial zones and logistics platforms has expanded considerably to support investment and exports. The automotive exports now exceed €10 billion annually, and last but certainly not least, the social protection generalization programme, launched in 2021, represents one of the most significant social reforms in the Kingdom's history.

Of course, the future awaits and Morocco aims to achieve 60% of electricity generation from renewable energy sources by 2030 (compared with approximately 50% today), it has set the objective of welcoming 26 million tourists by 2030, following the registration of 20 million tourists in 2025, and, finally, the country aims to become an African hub for green hydrogen production by 2030. We believe that all these objectives are achievable and feasible under the steady reign of our Majesty, King Mohammed VI.

Greece and Morocco share a long history of cultural affinity and geographical proximity, yet there remains considerable potential to expand bilateral trade. What opportunities would you encourage Greek entrepreneurs and business leaders to explore in Morocco? Conversely, which Moroccan products, services, or industries do you believe have a potential to establish a stronger presence in the Greek market?

Morocco offers a plethora of opportunities for Greek Entrepreneurs but first, I would like to remind you that there are several Greek companies already present in Morocco which contribute, with their expertise, to the remarkable development taking place across all regions of the country. Archirodon is constructing a port in the southern provinces with an investment of €1 billion, CCC is active in the mining sector, while others operate in technology, and several companies are currently preparing to establish operations in the energy and water desalination sectors.

At the same time, Morocco is becoming a major player in clean energy, with the objective of exceeding 60% of installed electricity capacity from renewable sources by 2030. The Kingdom is investing heavily in solar energy, wind power, green hydrogen and related infrastructure. Thus, Greek-Moroccan partnerships could emerge around industrial decarbonisation projects, particularly to meet Europe's growing demand for green energy. Seawater desalination also represents a promising area, with around

ten planned facilities, three of which have already been completed.

In the food and agriculture sector, Greece has strong expertise in high-value-added Mediterranean products (olive oil, dairy products, organic agriculture, etc.), which could be adapted to the needs of the Moroccan market, with nearly 38 million consumers, while also providing access to African markets.



In the hospitality sector, both countries have strong but complementary tourism identities. Morocco aims to welcome more than 26 million tourists by 2030, while Greece receives more than 35 million international visitors annually. Greek companies could therefore explore opportunities in hotel development, digital tourism solutions, and travel packages combining Greek and Moroccan destinations;

Aquaculture and fisheries are two other promising sectors where Greek operators could develop partnerships alongside Scandinavian and Western European companies.

Road construction represents another potential niche for Greek companies, as Morocco continues to expand its motorway network. The recent opening of the Donald Trump motorway, linking Tangier (Tanger Med Port) to the Mauritanian border, has completed a 2,500 km strategic road connection.

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Lastly, the construction of the 6,900 km gas pipeline linking 13 African countries, from Nigeria to Morocco, represents a strategic asset for Europe and the Mediterranean in diversifying energy suppliers, particularly in the current geopolitical context affecting the Persian Gulf. Greek expertise is also an advantage, as the pipeline is expected to transport 30 billion cubic metres annually.

On the other hand, Greece, as a strategic gateway to the European Union market, provides a number of opportunities for Moroccan companies. Moroccan products with strong export potential include citrus fruits, argan oil and seafood, thanks to their quality, competitiveness and growing demand among European consumers. Morocco can also strengthen its appeal among Greek visitors through partnerships between travel agencies and enhanced cultural exchanges and lastly, the strategic geographical positions of both countries offer significant potential for cooperation in maritime logistics: The Tanger Med port complex, connected to more than 180 ports in 70 countries, and Greece's major ports, particularly Piraeus, can further strengthen trade flows between Africa, Europe and the Mediterranean region.

As Morocco continues to strengthen its position both within Africa and on the international stage, how do you see the Kingdom's relationship with Europe evolving? In this context, what role can Greece, with its own strategic position in the Mediterranean and its long-standing ties with the Arab world, play in deepening Morocco's engagement with Europe?

Greece and Morocco share a Mediterranean vision based on dialogue between cultures, cooperation, and regional stability. Their partnership can therefore contribute to building a more integrated Euro-Mediterranean space, where Morocco would be not only a partner of Europe, but also a key player in strengthening ties and fostering rapprochement between Europe and Africa.

Morocco has emerged as an increasingly attractive destination for international investors, supported by its political stability, strategic geographical position, and evolving legal and economic framework. Could you give us an overview of the principal sectors currently attracting foreign direct investment?

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Morocco, which has emerged as one of Africa's leading industrial economies, is attracting increasing foreign investment thanks to its stability, its strategic position between Europe and Africa, and the continuous improvement of its business environment. The main sectors attracting investors' interest include the automotive industry, aerospace, renewable energy, green hydrogen, agribusiness, tourism, and digital technologies. Through its modern infrastructure and its role as a regional platform, Morocco provides international companies with opportunities to access African, European, and Mediterranean markets.

During your tenure as Ambassador of His Majesty King Mohammed VI to Greece, bilateral relations have gained further momentum, particularly in the fields of culture and heritage. The recent Morocco Craftsmanship Week, held last May, was an excellent example of this growing cooperation. How do you assess the impact and outcome of such initiatives, and what new areas of cultural or institutional cooperation are currently being explored with the Greek Government?

Beyond handicrafts and heritage, new areas of cooperation are being explored, particularly in the fields of research, culture, education, academic mobility, and heritage preservation. The objective is to strengthen a lasting dialogue between Morocco and Greece, based on mutual understanding, knowledge sharing, and the exchange of experiences.

Morocco has long held a special place in the imagination of writers, artists, filmmakers, and travellers from around the world. In your view, what makes Morocco such a distinctive and enduring destination for celebrities and international audience?

Beyond its landscapes, Morocco is home to one of the world's oldest monarchies, second only to Japan's in terms of longevity. The authenticity of its cultural identity, the beauty of its craftsmanship, its gastronomy, and the hospitality of its people are also key elements that make Morocco a unique destination. The country has succeeded in preserving its identity while remaining open to the world, which explains its appeal to creators, travellers, and the international public.

You currently serve as the Dean of the Arab Diplomatic Corps in Greece, a position of considerable diplomatic significance. How would you describe the role and contribution of the Arab Diplomatic Corps in strengthening diplomatic, economic, cultural, and business ties between the Arab world and Greece?

The Arab diplomatic corps in Greece plays an essential role in strengthening dialogue and cooperation between Greece and the Arab world by promoting political, economic, cultural, and people-to-people exchanges. Through coordination among the various Arab diplomatic missions, it helps build bridges of mutual understanding and foster partnerships in areas of common interest, such as trade, energy, tourism, culture, and regional stability. In this context, it serves as a vital link between the two shores of the Mediterranean, reinforcing historic relations while opening new avenues for cooperation.

Finally, looking back on your years of service in Greece, which aspects of the country and its people have left the strongest impression on you? What hopes do you have for the future of Greek-Moroccan relations?

Greece is a country full of potential. Since my arrival, I have continuously met people who are deeply attached to their culture and committed to preserving their identity. I have discovered a hardworking people determined to build a better future for their children.

While Greece's history is remarkable, its future is even more promising. The Mediterranean is also part of my identity as a Moroccan, and I have never felt truly far from home, as our traditions and customs are so closely connected that I feel very much at ease here.

My mission in Greece is still ongoing, and I remain convinced that the best is yet to come at every level, particularly in further strengthening the ties between Greece and Morocco. Inshallah.

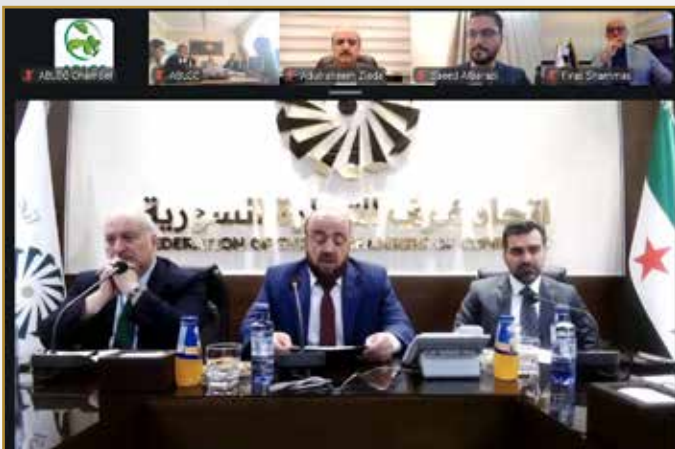

Europe and Syria Reconnect: A Closed Dialogue Between the Syrian Private Sector and the European Commission



On 29 June 2026, the Arab Belgian Luxembourg Chamber of Commerce, together with the Union of Arab Chambers and the Joint Arab Foreign Chambers in Europe, convened a closed dialogue between the Syrian private sector and the European Commission. The meeting brought together DG MENA of the European Commission, the Federation of Syrian Chambers of Commerce and the heads of several of its committees, the Federation of Syrian Chambers of Industry, Syrian companies in pharmaceuticals, food, industry, steel and fashion, a number of Arab and Arab-European chambers of commerce, and a group of European companies with a concrete interest in the Syrian market.

The dialogue came at a genuine turning point. The European Union lifted its economic sanctions on

Syria in May 2025, keeping only targeted measures on security grounds and against the former leadership, and fully resumed the 1978 Cooperation Agreement that frames trade between the two sides. During her visit to Damascus in January 2026, the President of the European Commission announced a package of 620 million euros for socio-economic recovery and humanitarian aid, within a total bilateral contribution of 455 million euros for 2024–2027 built around three priorities: institution building, socio-economic recovery, and transitional justice.

A strong Greek presence on the European side

For the members of the Arab-Hellenic Chamber, one of the most encouraging features of the meeting was the



visible engagement of companies from, or deeply rooted in, the Greek business community. The European private-sector delegation included Archirodon, the international marine and infrastructure contractor; Consolidated Contractors Company (CCC), the Athens-headquartered international engineering and construction group; PPC (Public Power Corporation of Greece), the country's leading electricity utility; Weiss Hellas – Interna, the Greek manufacturer of metal ceiling systems and interior construction solutions; and TTSA, the Greek telecommunications and satellite connectivity company.

Their profiles matched, almost point by point, the priorities voiced around the table: port development and marine works — including early discussions on the Latakia port project — large-scale construction and complex industrial plants, power generation and energy infrastructure, building materials for reconstruction, and the digital connectivity that Syria's weak internet infrastructure so clearly requires. Greek companies, with their long experience in the Eastern Mediterranean and the Arab world, are naturally positioned to be among the first movers in Syria's reconstruction — estimated by the World Bank at around 200 billion euros, a gap that public funds alone cannot fill and that must be bridged by the private sector and the development banks.

European participants also delivered a shared message to the Commission: EU money should support EU companies, given the intense competition from other regions. The Commission responded that it can back European firms through guarantees, blended finance and the development banks, and offered a dedicated meeting on exactly this question.

What the European Commission put on the table

The Commission presented three mutually reinforcing tracks for engaging the private sector: creating an enabling business environment and facilitating trade, notably through a demand-driven Technical Assistance Hub and a recently

adopted investment law; de-risking investment through the European Fund for Sustainable Development, which offers guarantees and blended finance channelled through European and national development banks; and building connections and trust through information sharing and business events such as this one. Support to value chains — pharmaceuticals, olive oil, wheat — the rehabilitation of key infrastructure, and microfinance for SMEs form the core of the socio-economic recovery envelope.

Banking first: the binding constraint

One message dominated the meeting: without a working banking channel, there can be no proper business for either side. Although Syria as a country is no longer under sanctions, European banks remain cautious for lack of legal certainty over ownership and control of counterparties, and payments — including for food and medicine — are delayed or refused. Syrian exporters cannot collect the value of their invoices at home, and the devaluation of the Syrian pound, payment in local currency and unpaid dues have led, most dramatically, to an eighteen-month rupture in the supply of free medicines to Syrian patients. The Commission acknowledged the over-compliance problem directly, pointed to the



enhanced due diligence triggered by Syria's FATF grey-listing, and said it will consider assistance to help Syria exit the grey list. It offered to organize, in the short term, a banking and sanctions workshop together with a small joint banking committee.

Where the opportunities lie

Beyond finance, participants mapped out the sectors where recovery can start moving within the next 12 to 24 months:

- Agriculture and agri-food exports, with cold chain and warehousing, supported by retraining of exporters on European norms and standards and a return of Syrian producers to fairs such as Anuga, SIAL and Alimentaria;
- Labour-intensive industry — garments, furniture, food — building on Syria's most underused asset, its resilient and increasingly multilingual workforce;
- Water and energy, described as the most urgent of all: with leakage rates of 30–40% in major cities and boreholes running dry, desalination, water treatment and power generation were identified as keys to recovery;
- Logistics, ports and trade corridors, with wide agreement on Syria's potential as a hub for Europe given its geography, and EU interest in regional rail and corridor projects;
- Construction and large infrastructure, where European contractors expressed clear interest in reconstruction, provided the banking system functions and guarantees — for instance from export credit agencies — are available;

- Skills and digital infrastructure, with the Federation launching an Education and Vocational Training Committee and, for the first time, a system of accredited professional certificates.

Next steps

The meeting closed as the first step in a continuing process. The private sector, with the support of the organising chambers, will submit a one-page list of concrete needs and regulatory points where EU action would matter most. The Commission will organise a hybrid banking and sanctions workshop with the department in charge of sanctions. And the convening chambers proposed a Syria Private Sector Recovery Platform — joining the Syrian, Arab and Arab-foreign chambers — to run business matching, an investment pipeline, SME support, market intelligence, regulatory dialogue and project preparation, and to serve as the structured channel through which EU funds for private-sector projects can be monitored.

An expo is planned in Syria towards the end of the year, with interest already expressed by several large European engineering contractors. The Arab-Hellenic Chamber of Commerce and Development will keep its members informed of these initiatives and of the concrete opportunities they open for Greek business in the Syrian market.

The 29th Arab-German Business Forum was successfully held in collaboration with Qatar Chamber, the German Chamber of Commerce and Industry (DIHK), the Union of Arab Chambers, and the Council of Arab Ambassadors in Germany from 17–19 June 2026 under the theme: “Beyond Transformation: Intelligence, Innovation, and Impact.”

Held under the patronage of the German Federal Ministry for Economic Affairs and Energy and the Ministry of Commerce and Industry of the State of Qatar, the Forum welcomed the State of Qatar as Partner Country and brought together more than 450 distinguished participants and over 80 speakers, including senior government representatives, ambassadors, business leaders, investors, and experts from Germany and across the Arab world.

Ghorfa was particularly honored to welcome H.E. Mrs. Katherina Reiche, Federal Minister for Economic Affairs and Energy of Germany, and H.E. Dr. Ahmad Bin Mohammed Al Sayed, Minister of State for Foreign Trade Affairs of the State of Qatar, alongside numerous high-level delegations from Germany and the Arab world. Their participation underscored the strategic importance of Arab-German business cooperation and the shared commitment to advancing trade, investment, innovation, and sustainable economic development.

Marking the 50th anniversary of the Ghorfa Arab-German Chamber of Commerce and Industry, this year’s Forum once again demonstrated its role as the leading platform for Arab-German economic and business dialogue and cooperation.



A key focus across all panels and round tables was the impact of current geopolitical developments and regional pressures, and how strengthened Arab-German business cooperation can jointly address these challenges and develop resilient, forward-looking solutions.

The discussions covered key themes including private sector-driven industrial transformation in the Arab region, Qatar's role as a global investment hub, artificial intelligence and research & development, industrial supercorridors and regional growth, sustainable reconstruction and development, digital trust and resilience, resilient healthcare and hospitality systems, the energy-water nexus and sustainability, as well as international partnerships and diplomacy.

In addition to the forum's sessions, numerous high-level bilateral meetings, delegation visits, and B2B

matchmaking sessions were hosted, creating valuable opportunities for direct exchange between companies, policymakers, investors, and decision-makers. These interactions opened new avenues for cooperation and laid the groundwork for future partnerships across key sectors.

The 29th Arab-German Business Forum reaffirmed that the future of Arab-German business relations lies in combining intelligence, innovation, and impactful collaboration. As both regions continue to navigate economic transformation and global challenges, the Forum highlighted the importance of trusted partnerships, forward-looking investments, and shared ambitions in driving sustainable growth and prosperity for the decades ahead.

Although geopolitical developments in the Middle East temporarily affected export activity across the marble sector, IKTINOS views these conditions as external and short-term challenges rather than structural weaknesses. At the same time, discussions with the banking sector regarding financing restructuring are progressing positively, while the strategic development of the company's landmark tourism property in Sitia, Crete, continues to advance through its collaboration with Auberge Resorts Collection and the selection of an internationally renowned architectural firm.

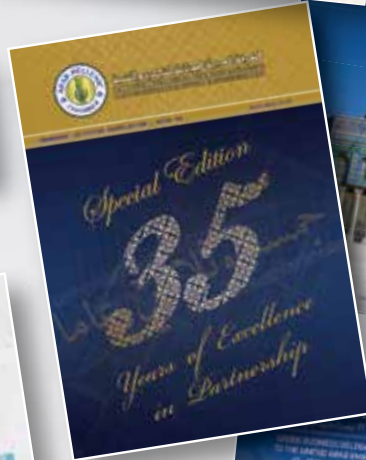
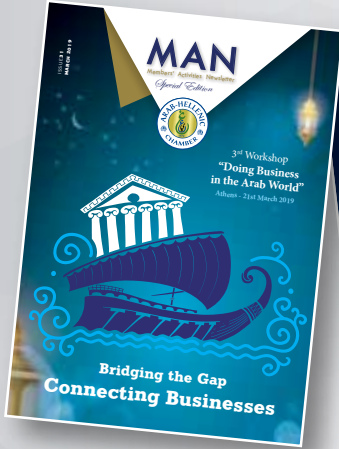

يصدر هذا العدد من المجلة للإعلان والتمهيد لسير التحضير للفعالية الرئيسية للغرفة، "المنتدى الاقتصادي العربي - اليوناني الخامس عشر"، المزمع عقده في 25 و26 نوفمبر/ تشرين الثاني القادم. ويأتي اختيارنا لقطاعي الطاقة والإنشاءات محورين لأعمال المنتدى ومداولاته وجلساته، انطلاقًا من الأهمية الاقتصادية والاستراتيجية لهذين القطاعين بالنسبة لدولنا العربية واليونان على حد سواء، فضلًا عما يتصل بهما من مجالات عمل أخرى متعددة، مما يضيف بُعدًا إضافيًا ويوفر فرصًا واعدة للمشاركين في مداولات المنتدى واجتماعاته.

ولعل اختيار هذين المحورين ينبع من واقع ما تملكه بلادنا العربية من مقومات طبيعية هائلة في هذين القطاعين تحديدًا؛ فالبتروك يملأ باطن أرضنا، وتتبع الطاقة المتجددة من مياهنا وشمسنا ورياحنا على امتداد وطننا العربي كله. ويضاف إلى ذلك موقعنا الذي يتوسط قارات العالم، وما لدينا من مصادر وموارد تكفل حاضرتنا ومستقبل أجيالنا القادمة، وثروة بشرية بشقيها المؤهل وغير المؤهل. وتشكل هذه المقومات مجتمعة أسس اقتصاد قوي وقادر على تحقيق نمو مستدام، غير أن تحقيق ذلك يستلزم العلم والإدراك والرؤية والإدارة المتطورة والعمل الجاد. وكما تدل الأرقام، فإن بعضًا من دولنا سعت بالفعل إلى ترجمة هذه المقومات إلى واقع ملموس، مضيئًا إليها أبعادًا أخرى تتمثل في انتهاج سياسات حكيمة، وترسيخ أهمية تعاوننا كدول عربية أولًا، ثم تطوير علاقاتنا الاقتصادية مع دول الجوار الأوروبية، وعلى رأسها اليونان.

لماذا اليونان بالذات؟ نبدأ بالاعتبارات الثانوية، وأولها ما تتسم به علاقاتنا من تداخل حضاري مشرف عبر مئات السنين، ومواقف مشتركة في المحافل الإقليمية والدولية. أما الاعتبارات الأخرى، فهي ما نلمسه من متغيرات جيوسياسية ما زالت دلالاتها غير واضحة، لكننا ندرك جيدًا أن هناك تعقيدات ملموسة تشهدها سلاسل الإمداد اليوم، وارتفاعًا في أسعار المواد الغذائية وغيرها، وأن هناك حاجة ماسة إلى إعطاء الأفضلية للتعاون والتجارة على المستوى الإقليمي.

أما الاعتبار الرئيسي، فهو أن اليونان مشهود لها بريادتها في تجارة النقل البحري، إذ يفوق أسطولها البحري خمسة آلاف سفينة، وهي ريادة ينظر إليها اليونانيون بوصفها ثروة تاريخية لا يمكن التفريط بها، بل تستوجب عملاً دؤوبًا ومستمرًا لتطويرها. كما أن لليونان باعًا طويلًا في قطاعات عمل عدة، وفي مقدمتها الطاقة والإنشاءات، وهما محورا عمل منتدانا الخامس عشر. وتجدر الإشارة إلى سجل اليونان الحافل في المشاركة في مشاريع البنية التحتية في كثير من دولنا العربية، ونعتقد بأنها الدولة الأوروبية الوحيدة التي تفوقت في هذا المجال على أي دولة أوروبية أخرى من حيث عدد المشاريع المنجزة. وتشهد علاقات اليونان بدولنا العربية اليوم تطورًا واضحًا في جوانب عدة، مع مشاريع حيوية قائمة بين اليونان وبعض دولنا العربية، وهو ما أضفى بُعدًا استراتيجيًا على هذه العلاقات.

وختامًا، تبقى المصالح المشتركة هي التي تحدد وتُحتم كل مسار، ومن هذا المنطلق، فإن مصلحة الغرفة العربية اليونانية تتمثل في تعزيز مسار العلاقات الاقتصادية بين الدول العربية واليونان، وهو الهدف الذي نعمل من أجله منذ أكثر من أربعة عقود ونصف.
